Then divorced, Bob met his late husband Rick Mart while stationed in Cleveland. They were together for 35 years before Rick's passing. Bob spent a total of 21 years in the Air Force, including his final assignment in Washington, D.C. at the White House. He had the honor of being selected to serve as Presidential support staff.

Bob has been a member of our Fellowship for 7 years and has enjoyed volunteering in different capacities during that time. Bob has been the "face of our Fellowship", greeting everyone at the door on Sunday and welcoming all, especially visitors and guests coming to our church for the first time.
