Greetings and well wishes to all of our members:

It has been an eventful week here in Bay County, in the state of Georgia, and in our nation's capital. I hope you have gotten more sleep than I have this week. Our county scheduled its first appointments for the COVID-19 vaccine, which caused a fair amount of chaos and frustration. According to the newspaper, tens of thousands of seniors are trying to schedule an appointment for the one thousand shots to be given. On Monday night, I woke up numerous times wondering when and how they would make the appointments available and checking my phone and laptop. Well, it's no surprise that, even with sincere effort, I did not get an appointment.

There was no time to dwell on the mystery and frustration of the vaccine distribution. By Tuesday night, I was swept up in the election results in the Senate races in Georgia, with numbers coming in continuously, but giving new meaning to the phrase, "too close to call". Once again, I had to stay up very late to assure myself of the results.

But no time to rest, only a few hours later, it was time to certify the national vote. As if there wasn't enough acrimony in the Congressmen's and women's challenges to the vote count, there was an insurrection at the Capitol Building, the very same place where our national leaders were assembled. Once again, to assure myself that the wheels of democracy would continue to turn until the votes were certified and that no more violence was at hand, I was up late again. It was just about 3 AM when certification was finally achieved.

So, let's review: vaccinations have begun; two democratic senators have been elected in Georgia; the national vote for President and Vice-President has been certified and I got no sleep. A pretty good trade off I would say.

This is a classic case of the glass being half full. I would argue though that the glass is at least 75 percent full. There were problems big and small all week, but the right things happened. Given what this country and all of us have endured, this is cause for celebration. Just a few months ago we were still anxiously hoping we would soon have a vaccine that was effective. Let's concentrate on the miracle of having a vaccine, no matter how slow the roll-out may be.



With two new senators on their way to Washington, D.C. we can be hopeful. We can allow ourselves to believe that cabinet members, judges, and other administrative appointments will be made, funds will be authorized, legislation will be passed by both houses and programs will be implemented. WOW!

Finally, there are no more legal challenges or opportunities left for the current administration to halt the transition of power. Like many, I will be holding my breath until it actually happens. I am not naïve enough to believe that our problems are over, but I do think they may be receding.

We have all been through an experience like none other. We have had as many as four thousand people dying each day in this country due to the corona virus and the anemic, disorganized federal response. But there are many reasons to believe that things are going in the right direction and we will survive the ordeal. Wash your hands, wear your masks, socially distance and do all the things that will keep you safe. We will soon see the better new year that we have all hoped for.
