*Greetings and good wishes to all of our members,*

*Serena Dee Latiolais has been a member of our Fellowship for many years and was recently elected to a position on the UUFBC Leadership Development Committee. Serena Dee shares her life story with us now.*

Nee Deloris Gordon, Serena Dee says she has “Had a rich, diverse, and excitingly entertaining life!” Born into illiteracy and abject poverty, the 7<sup>th</sup> of 9 children, child of share croppers, she learned early the value of an education. Losing her mother at age 7 and orphaned by age 9, she then learned the value of practicality. Being adopted at age 11 brought more challenges and lessons to be learned. The first 21 years were challenging but things took an upward swing after the age of 21. Serena Dee earned a B.A and M.Ed. in elementary education, the first in her family to achieve this status, in order to make a difference in children’s lives.

She married and was granted the role of motherhood to her late husband’s 3 youngest children. Moving frequently due to job changes and living on two different sailboats brought delight and wonder at Mother Nature’s designs. Serena said, “We sailed up and down the Gulf Coast almost every weekend and on every available holiday.” Altogether, the couple and their four children (by now they had adopted a toddler) lived for seven years on the boats. But sailboat living came to an abrupt halt when her husband’s heart needed repair or transplant.

They moved from Tampa to the Panama City area, where Serena Dee took a job in the public school system, cared for her ailing husband, and earned an Ed.S in Education Leadership. Here in the Bay area, she first encountered the people of the local Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, an experience that would help shape her next vocation, interfaith ministry. Over the next few years Serena Dee completed several ordinations in paganism, FOI, Native American Spirituality, and Reiki attunement mastery. She has various certifications in spiritual counseling, especially grief counseling. Following her late husband’s death, Serena Dee took up that very ministry, hoping to continue to make a difference in people’s lives. As a UU member, Serena Dee served as Vice President on the UUFBC Board and as a member of the Faith Development (Worship) Committee. Later she was instrumental in helping to start the Interfaith Harmony Council, a group of likeminded individuals who are seeking a voice in the spiritual community for alternative and comparative religions.

Serena Dee has had the pleasure of two lifetime loves, her late husband and her current wife. Upon retirement, she and her wife Jeri have had the joy of visiting many places in the world. “We have been to the islands, to Belgium, France and Canada. These have all been experiences of a lifetime. We are not finished traveling yet.” In the words of Abraham-Hicks, Serena Dee believes that, in life, ‘Joy is the key’ and she certainly has been enjoying the travels and the events in her life.
