*On this, the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of 9/11, we solemnly reflect on the event which changed the course of history and devastated so many lives in its wake. We also respect its historic relevance and the effect it has had around the globe.*

*Several things have struck me during the last few days of media coverage. I was surprised to learn that more than 1/3 of the stars on the CIA's memorial wall were placed there to commemorate agents who died during the years since 9/11, while attempting to gain sufficient intelligence to prevent another such attack. While the whole story is one for another time, when I was young my parents had close friends who invited us to spend a week or so at their lake house each summer. This couple had four children, two older than I and two who were younger. We would swim, have fun, watch 4<sup>th</sup> of July fireworks and eat lots of ice cream. We would go to the nearby amusement park and ride the Ferris wheel. It was the epitome of the midwestern American good time.*

*But years went by, we all got older and went our separate ways. I stayed generally aware of this family's evolution. John and I even went back one summer to visit the now much older couple who were my parents' friends. I was aware that one of the younger kids, grown now, had graduated from college, was fluent in Farci and worked for the federal government. Then out of the blue, I heard she had died suddenly overseas. It took me awhile, but I now have put pieces together and realize that one of those stars on the wall is for her...and her ultimate sacrifice. I think about those summer days, I picture her as a child, and I can guess how she developed a love for her country that gave her strength and courage and the desire to do what she could to preserve it.*

*Today, I am thinking of her and all those who meet their best selves in the celebration and defense of our country. While I constantly pray for peace, I know peace is hard won. It requires all of us to seek our best selves and make our own contributions to our community and to our country. As UU's we commit to our 6<sup>th</sup> Principle, "The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all." Let us fully re-commit to our 6<sup>th</sup> Principle today, in memory of all those who perished and all those who responded.*
