

What an eye-opening and heart-softening experience! I thought I understood the history of slavery in this country, but I learned so much more about how the kidnapping and enslavement of 12 million African people has continued to poison and damage our nation through Reconstruction, Jim Crow, lynching, voter suppression and mass incarceration in the present day.


Is there really much difference between a man yanked out of jail and hung from a tree by an angry lynching mob and a man yanked off the sidewalk and killed under the weight of a police officer's knee while he smiled at the crowd?

### **Sunflowers**

Did you know that Ukraine's national flower is the sunflower? Did you also know that sunflowers were originally imported to Ukraine from North America about 200 years ago? When the Orthodox Church restricted butter during lent, sunflowers provided sunflower oil to use instead. Soon there were fields of sunflowers everywhere as they became more and more popular.

Not only does Ukraine grow and export sunflower seeds and oil today, you can see sunflowers in the yards of homes that are grown to be woven into wreaths, known as "venkis", for girls to wear. Sunflowers are also celebrated in Ukrainian folk art, such as embroidery and paintings that are called "petrykivka".

Sunflowers are a symbol of things we share with Ukrainians and the appreciation we all have for nature and its beauty. The sunflower may now also serve as a symbol of hope for the survival of the Ukrainian people and their country.




